The IER predicts an increase in the usage ofrenewable energy through 2040. To keep up with current demand, utility companies like Long Island PSEG have contributed to a worldwide surge in green energy investments that will continue to grow as markets mature, technology prices continue to fall, and the growing urgency to reduce carbon emissions increases.

"These issues present challenges to business owners, entrepreneurs, and municipalities who may not understand the intricacies of environmental law."
